COURSE DESCRIPTION & PURPOSE

Communication 1 deals with the essentials for Christ-exalting exposition. It covers the principle matters of preparing and delivering sermons that are faithful to God's word.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- To foster ability in preaching sermons that exalt Jesus Christ.
- To emphasize the importance of personal holiness for faithful preaching.
- To introduce student to the basic construction of sermons.
- To cultivate the student's knowledge of various approaches to preaching.
- To promote dependence on the Holy Spirit in preaching.
- To encourage understanding of the Bible's commands about preaching.

Students will submit a reading report at the end of the semester.



COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- **2 Book Interactions:** Write a 1,200-word review each of 1) *Princeton and Preaching* by Garretson, and 2) *Preaching and Preachers* Lloyd-Jones. The review should summarize the book's content, analyze the book's key contributions, and offer specific encouragements the book provided to the student. Keep quotations from the book to a minimum.
- **6 Bible Memorizations:** Students will memorize six biblical passages that are significant for gospel preaching. You are expected to have memorized the assigned passage—*in the English Standard Version*—prior to the relevant week of class. A "Bible Memory Quiz" will be administered at the beginning of the applicable class date.
- **6 Sermon Evaluations:** Students will listen to six sermons over the course of the class. You are expected to listen to the assigned sermon before coming to class, and to submit a Sermon Evaluation Form (appended to the syllabus) on the assigned date. The sermon will be discussed in class, emphasizing the sermon's construction and delivery.
- **1 Sermon Preparation:** Students will prepare a 3,000–3,500-word sermon manuscript on one of the following texts: 1) Numbers 21:4–9, 2) Zechariah 3:1–5, 3) John 19:28–37, or 4) Hebrews 4:14–16. The final submission will be a sermon manuscript and two outlines, any of which could be brought into the pulpit.
 - Full Manuscript: color-coded, as will be discussed in class.
 - o Any Scripture in blue
 - Any quote in green
 - Any application in orange
 - o Any illustration in red
 - Any gospel exhortation highlighted in yellow
 - Brief Outline: introduction, main points and conclusion.
 - Full Outline: 3–4 pages that includes sub-points, transitions, illustrations and applications.

Students are required to attend all classes. If a student is "providentially hindered" from attending class, please notify the instructor. It is expected that students will keep current in their reading and assignments on time. Failure to comply with these standards will result in grade reduction, unless other arrangements have been made.

WRITING GUIDELINES

Review papers must be double-spaced, use 12 pt. Times New Roman font, and include pagination. Points will be deducted for spelling and grammar errors.
